Christmas in Germany

READ THE TEXT AND ANSWER THE QUESTIONS.

Ms Smart tells the kids that their classroom must be full of German Christmas traditions. Everybody must do something to make it German, but nobody knows anything about Christmas in Germany. Not a problem in the internet age! Their homework is to do an internet search for German Christmas traditions and decide what they want to prepare. 
Alisha: Hahahaha! That's not a game, that's a prank. I love it!

Ghana

People in Ghana celebrate (= feiern) Christmas from December 20 to the first week in January with lots of different activities. Over 66 languages are spoken in Ghana, and all these language groups have their own traditions. On Christmas Eve (December 24) many go to church services (= Gottesdienste). There is lots of singing, drumming (= Trommeln) and dancing. Sometimes these services and the dancing go on all night long. Everybody is dressed in colourful traditional clothes.

Australia

Christmas comes at the beginning of the summer holidays!

Children have their summer holidays from mid-December to early

February, so some people might even be camping at Christmas. Australians sometimes go out to sing Christmas carols (= Weihnachtslieder) on Christmas Eve (December 24).

People also decorate their gardens with Christmas trees and Christmas lights.

Neighbours sometimes have little competitions (= Wettbewerbe) to see who has the best light display.





India

Christmas is quite a small festival in India because most people are not Christians (= Christen). Midnight church service is very important for Christians in India. The whole family walks to the Mass, and after the service, everybody goes home for a massive dinner (mostly curries) and the giving and receiving of presents (= Geschenke). Churches in India are decorated with flowers and candles for the Christmas Eve midnight church service.

Kenya

Christmas is often the only time large (= groß) families will see each other all year, so it is very important. Many people go to a midnight church service. After the service, people go home and the party really starts – you might well not sleep that night! Barbecue is very popular for Christmas dinner.

Great Britain

Most families have a Christmas tree in their house for Christmas.

Everyone in the family helps to decorate the tree. Children believe that Father Christmas or Santa Claus puts presents into stockings (= Strümpfe) so they hang up stockings by the fire or by the bed on Christmas Eve (December 24). The next morning it's Christmas Day (December 25) – and yes, now the stockings are filled with chocolates and there are presents under the tree.
